BUILDING A CULTURE OF COLLABORATION

REFLECTIONS FROM LGV LEADERSHIP ON HOW THE INITIATIVE HAS SHIFTED THEIR WAY OF THINKING TOWARDS A SHARED IDENTITY THAT ENABLES DEEPER COLLABORATION AND STRENGTHENS REGIONAL ASSETS ACROSS MUNICIPAL BOUNDARIES.
